01 Nagoya Castle

Nagoya Castle was built in 1615 (Keicho 20) by Tokugawa Ieyasu.

Crowned with its iconic golden shachihoko (mythical tiger-headed carp), the castle's main keep once boasted the largest total floor area in history, alongside the magnificent Honmaru Palace and formidable fortifications that made it an impregnable stronghold. It was designated Japan's first National Treasure as a castle of exceptional grandeur.

Although much of it was lost to wartime fire, Nagoya Castle remains one of the nation's foremost historic sites, now designated as a Special Historic Site of Japan. The reconstructed Honmaru Palace vividly conveys the splendor of its original appearance.

02 Tokugawaen Garden

The site of Tokugawaen Garden was originally developed as a villa by Mitsutomo, the second lord of the Owari Tokugawa family. Mitsutomo's posthumous Buddhist name was Zuiryuin. Yoshichika, the 19th head of the Owari Tokugawa family, who donated the family's Ozone villa and its land to the City of Nagoya, became famous as the 'Tiger-Hunting Lord' or 'Marquis Tiger Hunter' after going on a tiger hunt in Malaya. Dragons and tigers have long been regarded as sacred creatures in Japan since ancient times, originating from Chinese mythology. The name Tokugawaen symbolizes the deep connection between these two figures—Mitsutomo (the Dragon) and Yoshichika (the Tiger).
